You Brought the Joy to SHERO

hank you, SHEROs! What a fantastic event on a beautiful Saturday morning in October, all because of you. We had 12 teams with over 550 donors (100+ more than last year!), and together we raised nearly \$100,000 to ensure women receive supportive housing, meals, access to mental and physical health services, and more.

Kenyatta T. Brunson, who celebrated her first year as President and CEO on Oct. 1, gave opening remarks, after a warm introduction from Deborah, one of our Erna's House residents. Local artist Candice Taylor revealed the first of three panels of an extraordinary mural project celebrating the Village's 50 years serving

women. Candice worked with Board member Peggy Sparks to develop the concept of the mural. All three panels will be revealed at our annual Gala in March 2023.

> We were pleased to have about 70 supporters walk the two miles, stopping at Erna's House and passing the Phyllis Wheatley location.

What joy to see so many of you join the fun and celebration of our annual SHERO Community Walk. As a panelist at the National Alliance to End Homelessness Conference this summer, I talked about the trauma of homelessness for women and shared our service delivery model with other providers. N Street Village was birthed 50 years ago on the platform of social justice and equality as a result of the 1968 riots after Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated. This transitioned into providing essential services including meals, showers, and meaningful connections that evolved into the beautiful building at 1333 N Street.

Today as equality is still being challenged on many fronts, N Street Village treats everyone with dignity and respect regardless of race, sexual orientation, or gender. Our portfolio of programs in eight locations stand on the promises of hope, diversity, and genuine joy, because those are the elements that help bring a divided nation into a unified and equal one.
